

2019 SHARES REPORT

At the end of 2019, our share portfolio was looking quite good. Its value had risen over the year by about \$84,000 from its value at the end of 2018. At \$557,036.67, all appeared rosy. On top of that we received \$19,853.70 in franking credits from the Australian Taxation Office, which should ensure the division has plenty of cash for operating expenses through 2020.

Of course you all know that since then, the world has been changed by the COVID-19 pandemic, and a symptom of that change has been a drop in the value of our portfolio, to \$488,721.69 on 27 April. This drop of \$69,000 takes us back to the portfolio value in mid-2018. However, the present market is particularly volatile, and it is only a month ago that the portfolio was worth \$30,000 less than today. We continually measure our performance against the ASX 200 by measuring the portfolio growth against the index. On this basis, our performance has been excellent. Using an arbitrary baseline of the ASX 200 and our portfolio 30 July 2007, the portfolio has consistently risen over the last 8 months and is now at its highest level ever. We have done this by trying to balance the need for growth against protecting our capital. We aim to have about 25% of our assets in interestbearing securities, which give us a security.



Our share investments are strongly biased towards companies with limited risk profiles, like banks, supermarkets and shopping centres, with a large holding in Australian Foundation, an investment group covering a wide spread of Australian companies. In the future, we expect to use the \$46,000 cash on hand in the investment portfolio to make modest purchases in similar companies. We also have about 10% in overseas investment funds to give us access to growth outside Australia.

BICENTENNIAL GOLD 88 ENDOWMENT

Report for the Year 2019

This Endowment was established with surplus funds derived from a successful gold conference in order to provide funds for the advancement of education and research in Earth Sciences for the benefit of Economic Geology in Australia.

In 2019, only 3 applications were received for awards in 2020, despite widespread publicity. This is a significant and disappointing drop in numbers compared to recent years for reasons which remain unclear. One application was for conference sponsorship, one for support for a Ph.D. project at Monash University and one for a paper presentation at a conference in WA by a Monash University PH.D Candidate.

Noteworthy was the quality of the two highly motivated Ph.D. applicants as shown by their background skills and commitment to geology and research.

Total funding sought by the applicants was in the order of \$20,000 as against an available sum of \$6,000.

Awards were recommended to the two Ph.D. candidates.

Due to some unusual circumstances, however, no payouts were made. One of the awards was declined by the successful applicant due to a change in personal circumstances. Payout of the second award is likely later in 2020, subject to receipt of some additional, confirmatory information.

This Endowment received some promotional benefits when 2018 award recipient Christopher Voisey presented aspects of his Ph.D. research to the GSA Vic. Div. at its October 2019 monthly meeting.

In conclusion, Prof. Chris Wilson and Ms. Ingrid Campbell, GSA (Vic Div), are again thanked for their contribution to the assessment process, as is the AusIMM Secretarial Support Team for its administrative back-up and the Endowment Trustees for their on-going support.

GSA Victoria Heritage Report to Committee Annual General Meeting 27th August 2020

The Geological Heritage subcommittee in Victoria has continued to maintain the database of sites of geological and geomorphological significance, with additional sites being supplied. At present, there are over 2,000 sites in the database. Unfortunately, as with previous years, the subcommittee has struggled somewhat over the past year mainly due to lack of time for committee members to work on geological heritage matters. However, we have continued to work towards better understanding of geological heritage in the state.

The subcommittee continues to maintain relationships with similar, non-GSA committees, including with Council Trench in Bacchus Marsh, where Susan White (previous subcommittee chair) is a member on the management committee, and with the Koonwarra Rail Trail committee of management, on which Gary Wallis is our representative, of which is being consulted by VicRoads as part of the highway widening near the Koonwarra Fish Beds. A display was held at the Bacchus Marsh Library for Earth Science week in 2019 in conjunction with the Council Trench committee on the volcanoes around Bacchus Marsh and their significance, which was successful.

As in the past, the committee has given advice to consultants and people wishing for information on particular sites of geological significance (e.g. Swallow Cave, Lake Burrumbeet). Such requests have been low this past year. Additionally, there has been a further supply of sites recently for the VEAC report on the Victorian Coastal Reserves, published in March 2020. Discussions with the Geological Survey of Victoria continue, with some contact over a potential site in Sydenham. It was concluded that this was not a site, and the matter documented for future records.

I wish to thank the members of the subcommittee for their work throughout the year.

GSAV Awards Committee Is pleased to present the

2020 Selwyn Medal



Associate Professor Stephen Gallagher



Associate Professor Stephen Gallagher has made significant contributions to our understanding of Victoria's sedimentary geological record throughout his career. Broadly, his work has developed our understanding of Victorian Cretaceous to recent microfossil evolution, climate change, paleooceanography, basin stratigraphy and economic geology. Stephen has over 50 scientific papers on Victorian geology, many of them published in highimpact, international journals, showcasing the significance of his work. This body of research has significantly developed our understanding of marine shelf evolution in south-eastern Australia, with implications for climate, oceanography and petroleum resources. Stephen has also added significantly to Victorian basin stratigraphy, including regional stratigraphic correlations and revised age constraints.

Stephen's papers form an important record of the climate history of Victoria for the last 80 million years. His research considers both climate variability in a Cretaceous greenhouse world, and the decent into Cenozoic icehouse conditions. This topic has been largely studied from a Northern Hemisphere perspective and so his work adds crucial detail from an Australian (Southern Hemisphere) standpoint. For example, his work on Oligocene climate records from Victoria was the first Oligocene sea level curve published from the Southern Hemisphere. In other projects, Dr. Gallagher's work with collaborators has added to several other important aspects of Victoria's geology including coal stratigraphy, floral history, economic geology and stratigraphic correlations. Highlighting many of his contributions to Victorian geology, Stephen co-authored a chapter in the recent edition of *Geology of Victoria*. In his broader research he has worked extensively on International Ocean Drilling Project expeditions around Australia and Asia, and has also focused on the Carboniferous geology of Ireland.

Dr. Stephen Gallagher has made significant contributions to Victorian geology through 25 years of teaching, playing a key role in educating multiple generations of geoscientists at the University of Melbourne. He taught first year classes for over 15 years, being instrumental in encouraging many students to continue into geology. In addition, he runs several field geology courses every year which are an important aspect of geoscience education. Dr. Gallagher has won multiple awards for his teaching. He has supervised over 40 Honours and Masters students as well as 11 PhD students.

In terms of service, Stephen served as Chair and Treasurer of the Geological Society of Australia, Victoria Division for several years, being instrumental in recruiting student GSAV members during this time. Stephen has organised four successful Selwyn Symposiums for the GSAV. In addition to this, he has run seminars and short courses for PESA, CSIRO, and most recently was chosen for the Royal Society's Howitt Lecture.

Overall, Stephen's contributions to research, teaching and the field of geology in Victoria make him a worthy recipient of the 2020 Selwyn Medal.

How are candidates nominated?

General Councillors

Divisional Councillors

A single nomination for Divisional Councillors must be submitted by the Divisional Committee to the Governing Council. Divisional nominees are to be endorsed by a meeting of the Division. The nomination from the Division must:

- · be in writing
- \cdot summarise the nominee's qualifications* to serve as a Divisional Councillor.
- * Qualifications should be limited to no more than 400 words in total.



Did You Miss It? Watch 'Writing on Stone -Graptolites and Ancient Ground' online. Fons VandenBerg

Since the earliest days of geological investigation, the primary method of determining the ages of Victoria's foundational rocks has been the analysis of fossils. In much of Victoria, the most critical fossils are no more than tiny marks on the rocks—the remains of extinct animals called graptolites. The name means "writing on stone," and that is what many of them look like.

Distinguished geologist and palaeontologist with <u>Museums Victoria</u>, Alfons VandenBerg, explains what these curious creatures were, and when and how they lived. Are they extinct, as was long believed? Given that we can't access their DNA, how can we determine their relationships? How are they useful for geological mapping? How did they protect themselves?

Fons demonstrates a variety of these 'marks' magnified, displaying an amazing diversity of characteristics. Most importantly, a close examination reveals the remarkably rapid evolution of those characteristics, making them a key tool in unravelling the sequence of events that made the foundation rocks of eastern Australia.
